From the desk of the Superintendent

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READ ACROSS AMERICA DAY



The students in our Math group have been diligently improving their skills with multiplying and dividing larger numbers, including decimals. We have also been practicing solving lots of word problems. The kids are getting much better at identifying key words and using them to help solve real-world problems. Each one of my students continues to grow and improve every day, and I am so proud of all of them!

Science Discoveries

5TH GRADE SCIENCE

In Science 5, right after the first of the year we began a unit studying weather patterns. We examined the fronts that bring us our weather and what to look for when we watch a weather report on television. As a class we determined what type of front, temperature and precipitation was needed for a snow day. Currently the class has taken on the role of astronomers. We have examined what force keeps us on Earth and keeps the moon where it is, in space. We took a look at shadows and how they change over the course of the day. Now, we are doing a project on the Constellations seen in the sky.

6TH GRADE SCIENCE

The geologists of Grade 6 just completed a unit on Volcanoes. In Technology and Science classes students did research on a volcano to discover what type of cone it had, what tectonic plate it is located on, type of magma came from it as well as the type of explosion occurred. Students then sat down with Ms. Larson, our technology personnel, and learned about a type of media to display their work on. Students made a brochure, using a computer program, on their volcano to try and persuade people to visit. Students enjoyed learning and had fun making these brochures. In Art class students worked in groups to make models of the three types of volcanoes. (Cinder, Composite and Shield Cones). Students had to research what they could use to actually model an erupting volcano. This was a very successful year, due to the fact that each and every volcano did erupt. We are currently looking at Earthquakes and how they travel through the Earth.

7TH GRADE SCIENCE

In Life Science we are working our way through the Human Body. We learned the name of the bones, what the job of the bone marrow is, and about the different types of skeletal injuries. Right now we are in the thick of the Circulatory System. We will be looking at what makes up blood, what are blood types and how the white blood cells work. We will travel through all the systems to discover how these systems work together to keep us healthy.



GRADE 8 PHYSICAL SCIENCE

Students in Physical Science are now playing the part of a Chemist. We have taken what we learned the last ten weeks and are now applying to Chemical Reactions. Previously student examined the Periodic Table and its trends. Students came to the table with the knowledge of what makes up an atom and the outside electrons are the subatomic particles that help with bonding. This making and breaking of bonds is what lead us to the study of solution and how acid and bases form. We did get to try out litmus paper and test various items to see if they were an acid or base. Currently we are working on Chemical Equations and how to balance them. We are then going to be looking at the various types of Chemical Reactions and how to classify them.



Big Buddy / Little Buddy Program

All 8th grade students have little buddies in Kindergarten. This is a wonderful program for both young and older students. It is great to watch how kind and caring the older kids are to the kindergarteners. And wow do the kinders look up to and love their big buddies!

So far this year they have gotten together many times.
In September.... Get to know you time in the gym
In October... Trick or treating in the halls
In November... Making paper bag turkeys for Thanksgiving
In December... Reading aloud and sharing cards and gifts
In January... Sledding party
In February... Exchanging valentines

Fun get togethers will be planned for the rest of the year too. Everyone always looks forward to big buddy/little buddy time!

Nurse's Office

I want to take this opportunity to thank all the parents/guardians of our students for all of your help, cooperation and understanding with the covid regulations this school year. I know at times it was confusing and frustrating, but because of your support and participation our school was successful in keeping our covid cases at a low number. Now we are celebrating the little things that we are able to do now. We love seeing all the smiling faces on our students and watching the kids move their desks together to be closer to their classmates.

It's great to say that I have no covid information or updates to pass on to you. We are starting to see "normal" school illnesses going around. Currently there is a stomach bug that seems to be starting.

Below is some routine information that I want to review with you.

Please keep your child home and/or contact your child's doctor for:

- Fever greater than 100.4° (taken by mouth)
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea within the last 24 hours
- Severe sore throat along with fever and feeling ill for more than 48 hours, or after exposure to Strep throat infection
- Honey-crusted sores around the nose or mouth or rash on other body parts
- Large amounts of mucous (liquid) from their nose, with face pain or headache
- Severe ear pain or fluid coming from the ear
- Severe headache, especially with fever

If your child has a fever, it is not a good idea to give them medicine like Tylenol or Advil and send them to school because as soon as the medicine wears off, the fever may return and you will be called to come and pick up your child.

Please keep children home for 24 hours after the fever ends or they have completed 24 hours of medication if prescribed by your health care provider.

For any absence from school, New York State Education law requires that the school have on file a written excuse by the parent or guardian when a student misses a scheduled day of school. The written excuse is kept on file for a period of five years.

Remind children to throw away used tissues, cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze, keep their hands away from their face, and to wash hands often with soap and warm water will help keep everyone healthier.

We had five 7th graders and five 8th graders participate in solving difficult math problems in an attempt to score points for our school. There are three rounds in each of the competitions. The first is arithmetic based, second is word problems, and third is a team portion. I have attached a picture of our team below!

We also had the boys modified basketball team complete an exciting season. A majority of our players had never played before and we still managed to win a few games. Winning is not all that matters though, our boys also worked great as a team and showed some impressive perseverance and positive attitudes. I truly enjoyed coaching this group.




Wyoming's PTO

Transportation to Non-Public

A written, dated and signed request from a parent or legal guardian requesting transportation to a non-public school must be received by the Superintendent of Schools on or before April 1, 2022. State Law requires the District transport its resident school aged children to non-public schools up to fifteen miles as measured between the home and the non-public school.

Pre-K or Five years of age by December 1, 2022 (eligible for Kindergarten)


